## Examples of the 14 Youth Program Elements of E3 Works

1. Tutoring, study skills training, instruction, and dropout prevention and dropout recovery services	<ul> <li>Academic support such as tutoring</li> <li>Assisting with overcoming learning obstacles</li> <li>Providing tools and resources to develop learning strategies</li> <li>Literacy development</li> <li>After-school opportunities</li> <li>Individualized instruction</li> </ul>
2) Alternative secondary school services or high school dropout recovery services	<ul> <li>Basic education skills training</li> <li>Individualized academic instruction</li> <li>English language learning</li> <li>Preparation for high school equivalency attainment (for high school dropouts only)</li> <li>Educating youth about alternative secondary school programs within the school district and helping them through the process of connecting to an appropriate program</li> </ul>
3) Paid and unpaid work experience	<ul> <li>Employment opportunities</li> <li>Pre-apprenticeship programs</li> <li>Internships</li> <li>Job shadowing</li> <li>On-the-job training (OJT) opportunities</li> </ul>
4) Occupational skills training	<ul> <li>Industry-recognized certificate or certification</li> <li>Certificate of Completion of a Registered Apprenticeship</li> <li>License recognized by the state or federal government</li> <li>Associate or bachelor's degree</li> </ul>
5) Education offered concurrently with workforce preparation and training	<ul> <li>Workforce preparation activities, basic academic skills education, and hands-on occupational skills training are taught within the same time frame and connected to a specific occupation, occupational cluster, or career pathway</li> </ul>
6) Leadership development opportunities	<ul> <li>Exposure to postsecondary educational possibilities</li> <li>Community and service-learning projects</li> <li>Peer-centered activities, including peer mentoring and tutoring</li> <li>Organizational and teamwork training, including team leadership training</li> <li>Training in decision-making, including determining priorities and problem solving</li> <li>Citizenship training, including life skills training such as parenting and work behavior training</li> </ul>
7) Supportive services	<ul> <li>Referrals to community programs/services and to state and federal public assistance programs</li> <li>Transportation assistance</li> <li>Childcare and dependent care assistance</li> <li>Housing assistance</li> <li>Needs-related payments</li> <li>Assistance with educational testing</li> <li>Reasonable accommodations for youth with disabilities</li> <li>Uniforms, work attire, and work-related equipment/tools</li> <li>Books, fees, school supplies for postsecondary education</li> <li>Payments/fees for employment and training-related applications, tests, certifications, and licenses</li> </ul>

8) Adult mentoring	<ul> <li>Formal relationship between a youth participant and an adult mentor that includes structured activities where the mentor offers guidance, support, and encouragement to help develop the youth's competence and character</li> </ul>
9) Comprehensive guidance and counseling	<ul><li>Drug and alcohol abuse counseling</li><li>Mental health counseling</li></ul>
10) Financial literacy education	<ul> <li>Helping participants create budgets and open checking and savings accounts</li> <li>Helping participants learn how to effectively manage spending, credit, and debt, including student loans and consumer credit</li> <li>Teaching participants the significance of credit reports and scores, their rights regarding credit and financial information, how to assure accuracy of a credit report and correct inaccuracies, and how to improve or maintain good credit</li> <li>Helping participants understand, evaluate, and compare financial products, services, and opportunities</li> <li>Educating participants about identity theft, ways they can protect themselves from identity theft and resolve cases of it, and their rights and protections related to personal and financial data</li> <li>Benefits planning and work incentives benefits counseling for youth with disabilities</li> </ul>
11) Entrepreneurial skills training	<ul> <li>Creatively seek out and identify business opportunities</li> <li>Develop budgets and forecast resource needs</li> <li>Understand various options for acquiring capital and the trade-offs associated with each option</li> <li>Communicate effectively and market oneself and one's ideas</li> </ul>
12) Career awareness, career exploration, and career counseling	<ul> <li>Providing labor market information (LMI) and employment information about in-demand industry sectors or occupations in the local area</li> <li>Providing access to skill, ability, and/or interest inventories</li> <li>Providing information about résumé preparation and/or assisting youth with résumé preparation</li> <li>Assisting with interview skills</li> <li>Discussing opportunities for work experience</li> <li>Discussing the long-term benefits of postsecondary education, such as increased earning power and career mobility</li> </ul>
13) Postsecondary preparation and transition activities	<ul> <li>Explore postsecondary education options including technical training schools, technical colleges, 4-year colleges and universities, and registered apprenticeship</li> <li>Prepare for SAT/ACT testing</li> <li>Connect to postsecondary education programs</li> <li>Navigate admissions processes</li> <li>Search and apply for scholarships and grants</li> <li>Accurately complete the proper financial aid applications</li> </ul>
14) Follow-up services	<ul> <li>Supportive services</li> <li>Adult mentoring</li> <li>Financial literacy education</li> <li>career awareness, exploration, and counseling services</li> <li>Postsecondary education preparation and transition activities</li> <li>Contact with the participant's employer, including assistance in addressing work-related problems that arise</li> </ul>
